





Setting: Queen Lili'uokalani (1838-1917), arr. Henry Lebedinsky

In the same way he took wine and having given thanks for it, he poured it out and gave the cup to his disciples, saying, "This cup is the new relationship with God, sealed with my blood. Take this and share it. I shall drink wine with you next in the coming Kingdom of God." And so together we pray:

All: Loving God, through your goodness we have this bread and wine to offer, which earth has given and human hands have made.

Presider: May we know your presence in the sharing of this bread, so that we may know your touch in all bread, all matter. We celebrate the life that Jesus has shared among his community through the centuries, and shares with us now. Made one in Christ and with each other, we offer these gifts and with them ourselves, a single, holy, living sacrifice.

All: Hear us, therefore, O Christ, and breathe your Spirit upon us and upon this bread and wine.

Presider: May they become for us your body, vibrant with your life, healing, renewing and making us whole. And as the bread and wine which we now eat and drink are changed into us, may we be changed again into you, bone of your bone, flesh of your flesh, loving and caring in the world. Therefore, we raise our voices, offering glory to God, from whom all love flows; glory to Jesus, who showed his love through suffering; glory to the Holy Spirit, who brings light to the darkest places; and we add our great "Amen" as we praise your name. **Amen.**




